Valley Falls Heritage Center Opens Saturday, June 14, 1-4 pm

ome visit this "hidden gem" of a museum on eight scenic acres at beautiful Valley Falls Farm! We begin our third season Saturday, June 14 and will be open thereafter for nine select Sunday afternoons through October. (See pg. 4 for the specific dates.) We are often asked - What is a heritage center? Dictionaries define a heritage center as "a museum that describes the history and culture of a particular place and its inhabitants." And that is exactly what you'll find at Valley Falls Farm and Heritage Center!

Our exhibits and panels tell the story of three intriguing 20th century owners of Valley Falls Farm – the self-proclaimed Count Munchow and his mysterious disappearance, the Beach family and their magnificent "Gentleman's Farm," and the Darico family who managed the farm and diligently cared for the land.

Have we piqued your interest? Come visit and take a self-guided tour, or join a group for a docent-led tour from 2-3 pm. There are six buildings to visit, filled with antique items all found on the farm and all having a story to tell. Make your first stop in the Welcome Center at the Red Barn to sign in and get informational materials. Admission is free!



In Memoriam – Ginny Gingras

The report updates and expands a section of the Management Plan for Valley Falls Park that was prepared by the Friends in 1995. It describes steps that can be taken to create the type of habitat certain wildlife prefer for nesting and raising young. The plan also recommends techniques to prevent the fields from evolving into forestland. The goal of the project is to offset losses of certain wildlife due

to increased use of the park by encouraging other birds, reptiles and insects to make Valley Falls Park their home. The group intends to initiate an update of the entire 1995 managment plan in the fall.

Pollinator Pathway at Valley Falls Farm

The Friends of Valley Falls is working with Jane Seymour of CT DEEP to establish a Pollinator Pathway in the Valley Falls area. A Pollinator Pathway is a continuous corridor of pollinator-friendly habitats for bees, butterflies, hummingbirds and other wildlife. The goal is to connect adjacent land areas to make a contiguous pathway of at least 750 meters (about ½ mile), which is the average range of native bees. The connected areas are required to have certain attributes that provide a thriving environment for the insects,

such as having food sources (flowers, or fruit) and a water source. They should also be pesticide-free.

In working toward this purpose, the Friends recently purchased several native pollinator-friendly plants and bushes (winterberry, meadowsweet.

cardinal flower, sweet pepperbush, and buttonbush) from the North Central Conservation District's annual plant sale.

Many thanks go to our Board member Bruce Dinnie and to Brian Dinnie for managing this project, picking up the plant order – AND, the hard part, getting them planted in the ground along the small stream that runs through Valley Falls Farm. Thank you Bruce and Brian!

Bluebird Project Update

Bluebirds typically like to nest at the edge of an open area or meadow. The fields at Valley Falls Farm and Valley Falls Park are a perfect habitat for this colorful bird.

Three years ago the Friends of Valley Falls initiated a project to attract more bluebirds to Valley Falls Farm and Valley Falls Park. The project has been led by Sheryl McMullen, a member of the Friends and former chairman of the Vernon Conservation Commission. The work involves cleaning and repairing the boxes in the spring, and then monitoring the boxes during the 60-day period from egg lay to fledge. This year, with help from husband Tim, Sheryl expanded the project into the fields at Valley Falls Park with the addition of five boxes. Mark Lucas, Parks & Recreation staff, cleared access to the old boxes that needed repair or replacement.

The project has been a resounding success. In addition to bluebirds, three other species, tree swallows, house wrens, and chickadees, occupied the boxes, all prevalent and welcome at Valley Falls! The 13 boxes at Valley Falls Farm have fledged 94 young birds in the first two years of the project!

Sheryl's objective with the project has been to share and educate. She has been assisted this year by Jeff Carlson and Jeremy Geller, both members of the Vernon Conservation Commission.
