A Great Season 3 at the Heritage Center!

It's a wrap! More than 250 visitors came out during out third year of operation and learned about the history of Valley Falls Farm while enjoying beautiful views. This season, our guided tours were particularly popular, along with the Christian Sharps special exhibit. The Friends partnered with the New England Civil War Museum to tell the story of Sharps: his work in developing the advanced breech-loading rifle and his efforts after the war to build a trout hatchery at Valley Falls Park. Sharps, who bought 150 acres along Railroad Brook, hoped to sell thousands of fresh water trout to local restaurants. Unfortunately, he died before his dream could be realized. If you were not able to visit the Heritage Center this year, the museum will re-open next spring. Exhibits and items in the six historic buildings mainly focus on three families who lived on this gentleman's farm from about 1910 to 1960. All of the artifacts on display were found in the buildings and tell the story of early Rockville-Vernon life in the first half of the 20th century.





Ringing the large mill bell that is now located near the Ice House was very popular on open house Sundays! A variety of bells, found in several of the buildings, were collected by the Darico family who lived on the property.

Artists Day 2025

Guitar duo Handler and Levesque played beautifully from the historic red barn, while Vernon resident Kathy King strolled the property and played her harp for the artists. Over 50 visitors stopped by to watch the artists at work, listen to the music, and tour the Heritage Center. Thanks to everyone who came out to support the event – it was a magical day of art, history, nature and music!

Volunteer Spotlight – Ann Noel

Ann Noel is one of our wonderful volunteers at Valley Falls Farm and Heritage Center. On open house Sundays, she is likely the first person you encounter upon arrival, since she often staffs the welcome desk in the red barn. This long-time Vernon resident actually lives in one of Beach cottages that was built in the 1930s. Mary Batterson Beach and her husband, Dr. Charles Beach, bought the 150-acre Valley Falls Farm in 1915. The prominent Hartford couple used the property as their weekend and summer home. While they built the large house on Bolton Road, over the years their children built several smaller homes on the

estate. In addition to being a Friends of Valley Falls member, Ann is on the Board of Directors and serves as its Secretary. Her knowledge of the history and people associated with the Valley Falls area has been invaluable, as have her ideas for expanding programs at the Heritage Center.
